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EDUCATION PROGRAMS 2015-2016 – OVERVIEW AND TABLE OF CONTENTS

Each season, The Repertory Theatre of St. Louis offers a broad spectrum of educational programming that touches the lives of youth and adults by making theatre accessible and fun for everyone. The Rep's educational programming is deeply woven into the social and economic fabric of the region, reaching audiences from throughout St. Louis, across Missouri and into Illinois. During the 2015-2016 season, The Rep served more than 45,000 people through our extensive array of education programs.

By engaging audiences—from age 5 to 95—in education programs filled with the myth, magic, wonder and spontaneous joy of theatre, The Rep strives to make the arts vital to and reflective of our daily lives.

The Imaginary Theatre Company (ITC) is at the heart of the theatre's educational endeavors, bringing the enchantment and wonder of live performance to young people, educators and parents throughout the bi-state region.

The 2015-2016 season was a milestone 40th anniversary "on the road" for the ITC tour. Four professional actors spent October to April traveling from urban schools in St. Louis to rural schools in the Ozarks to present three literature or history-based plays to youth in grades K-7. Productions were carefully selected, or specifically commissioned, to present themes connecting to student interests and school curricula.

Prior to seeing an ITC production, teachers receive a link to our website, where they can download a free, multidisciplinary study guide, created by The Rep specifically to enhance the experience for students seeing that show. The study guide contains information about the play and the playwright, as well as articles and suggested activities that correspond with school curricula.

Overall in the 2015-2016 season, ITC gave 136 performances at 80 schools and 17 community centers throughout Missouri, Illinois and into Arkansas, reaching a total of 34,279 students, educators and family members. (Some locations were visited more than once and some performances included audiences from more than one school.) In addition to the productions, ITC performed one Acting Up workshop in one school for 42 participants.



Goldilocks

The Story:

In this fun new musical take on the well-known tale, Goldilocks learns some much-needed lessons about friendship and acceptance. Freddy, a bear with a penchant for science, likes to spend his time exploring the forest with his friends, at least when they're not avoiding the troublemaking Goldilocks. She's got a habit of tormenting all the woodland creatures, but Freddy and his friends just might have an idea for an experiment that'll change her ways. Recommended for grades K-3.

In January, this tour visited the American Legion Hall in Mascoutah, IL, to provide a special Blue Star families performance for the children of military personnel. In April, ITC gave our very first pair of performances of this play for youth with sensory sensitivities and their families.

The Story:

Based on the tale by the Brothers Grimm, this beloved, warmhearted story is perfect for the holiday season, reminding us that where we find kindness, generosity and hope, anything is possible. Goodbye Marianne



The Story:

In 1938 Berlin, young Marianne Kohn arrives at school to find that Jewish students are no longer permitted, and her life begins to change in frightening ways. Soon friends and loved ones are disappearing, neighborhood shops are being burned, and even Marianne's father must flee to escape the Gestapo. Based on the author's childhood experiences in Nazi Germany, Goodbye Marianne is a stirring account of loss and love, and one girl's bravery in the face of a changing world. Recommended for grades 4-7.

Established in 1996 in collaboration with Springboard, WiseWrite is a unique program in which fifth grade students from two St. Louis area elementary schools learn how to write their own plays. Students gain new written communication skills, increase their ability to problem-solve, learn to collaborate and bolster their self-esteem.



In the 2015-2016 season, WiseWrite was provided, free of charge, to fifth graders in Dewey International Studies School in the St. Louis City District and Hudson Elementary School in the Webster Groves District. In all, this intensive program was in the classrooms for 27 instructional weeks between October and April.



Over the course of the program, students learned the elements of storytelling and playwriting, how to create original characters and how to write dialogue. During the writing-intensive part of the program in January and February, youth were coached through brainstorming, early drafts and revisions until their plays were completed. Plays were then submitted to The Rep.

In March, Reader's Theatre took place in the schools. Each fifth grade class selected a few plays to perform for other classrooms. Students became actors, scenic artists and stage managers, as they rehearsed for a few weeks before giving performances.

The culminating event for the program was the WiseWrite Festival, held on April 4, 2016. The most exemplary student plays were produced on The Rep's Mainstage, complete with costumes, stage lighting, music and a few props. The young playwrights sat surrounded by peers, educators and family members to watch their plays being performed by professional actors.

STUDENT MATINEE PERFORMANCES

The Rep schedules special performances of selected Mainstage productions to allow school groups to attend for the discounted price of \$10 per student. Our education department offers additional support programs, free of charge, to provide instructors with a unique means of integrating the arts into their curriculum.

In 2015-2016, teachers seeking an enriched theatre experience for their students could arrive early for a pre-show docent presentation. Trained volunteers led 20-minute discussions that offered youth insight into play content and technical values.



Prior to attending the theatre, teachers received a free multi-disciplinary study guide that explored topics covered in the play, provided background information on the playwright and offered insight into the technical aspects of the play. The guide also contained detailed articles and suggested activities corresponding to learning standards and school curricula. These guides were available for download from our website by teachers, parents and anyone from the general public who is interested in gaining insight into the production.

In 2015-2016, student matinee performances were attended by 4,638 students from 49 schools and colleges in Missouri and Illinois.

THEATRE ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES

Quick Start – New in 2015-2016, this initiative offered audiences a pre-show discussion that enhanced the Mainstage theatre experience with behind-the-scenes stories, background information and insider tidbits, led by a cast member an hour before he or she took the stage. Total participants: 2,211

Post-performance discussions – These dialogues provided an opportunity for audiences and cast members to meet after the show to explore play content, characterization and technical values, as well as actor motivation and training. Total participants: 1,935

Talk Theatre – This lecture series was hosted by The Rep's Volunteer Board the Monday evening following the opening of each Mainstage production. Featuring insights from a guest speaker, Talk Theatre was the go-to program for an in-depth look at The Rep's Mainstage productions. Total participants: 297

Theatre tours – School or community groups toured The Rep's performance spaces, shops and production areas for an insider's view of the theatre. Total participants: 436

Spotlight on Careers – Specially trained volunteers traveled to area schools to help youth explore the vast array of careers in the theatre. Total participants: 102

ACCESSIBILITY

Sensory-friendly performances – In April of 2016, The Rep held its first sensory-friendly performances of the Imaginary Theatre Company production *Goldilocks*. These performances were tailored for sensory-sensitive youth and their families, by adapting the lighting and sound to be less intense, making the actors aware of the audience's unique needs, providing a "pacing lane" for youth who need to move and a special room where children can go if they need a break from the show.



FM Assistive Listening System – The Browning Mainstage and Emerson Studio theatres at the Loretto-Hilton Center are equipped with FM assistive listening systems for patrons who are hard of hearing. Using FM sound waves, these unobtrusive receivers with surround earphones amplify the spoken dialogue and singing in a production. This does not require the removal of hearing aids.

Open Captioning – The final Sunday matinee performance of each 2015-2016 Mainstage production was presented with Open Captioning for the deaf and hard of hearing. At performances with Open Captioning, the spoken or sung dialogue was displayed in text on an electronic screen that was visible to one section of the seating area. In 2002, The Rep became the first and only live performance venue in the St. Louis region to offer Open Captioning.

Audio Description – In the 2015-2016 season, The Rep offered both live and recorded Audio Description for any non-preview performance of the Mainstage or Studio Theatre series, upon request. The description included program notes as well as information on the visual elements of the production.
