Prince Albert, Queen Victoria's husband, died a decade earlier in 1861, and the RAH along with the Albert Memorial (directly opposite in Kensington Gardens) and the Victoria & Albert Museum stand as memorials to his great ingenuity. With its vast rotunda, the RAH is one of the most recognisable buildings in the UK and has even been referred to as 'the nation's village hall'. Its stage has hosted some of the world's leading artists, and since 1941, it has been home to the BBC's Promenade Concerts. |

TOUR DIRECTORS

PHILL WARD

For the past fifteen years, Phill has been devising and running cultural tours. Previously, he spent two decades working in the performing arts as a manager and producer. At home working in both theatre and music, he has held positions in large institutions, including Royal Festival Hall and the V&A's Theatre Museum. He also managed London's oldest pub theatre, The King's Head, alongside maverick American artistic director Dan Crawford, maintaining a delicate balance between running the venue and transferring productions to the West End. In charge of cultural affairs for the English Speaking Union, Phill ran a programme of scholarships, cultural seminars and fundraising events, including interviews with actors, writers, musicians and politicians. As opera and music-theatre funding specialist at the Arts Council England, he developed an overview of the work of all the UK's opera companies, and when not on duty, sneaked into regional theatres to catch season-highlights on their way to the West End. Phill also worked on Liverpool's successful bid to become European Capital of Culture 2008. As a critic of opera and classical music, he contributed to various music publications, writing travel features on festivals and cultural hotspots in Europe and America.

PATRICK KNOX

While studying Law and English Literature at Cambridge University, Patrick fell in with a bad crowd and became an actor. He trained at Mountview and then, for many years, spent much of his life on tour. So far he has performed in India, Nepal, Lebanon, Turkey, Germany, Iraq, Sri Lanka, Denmark and Pakistan, as well as most corners of the UK. He spent a couple of summers touring Sweden in a six-person Romeo and Juliet. His work has mostly been in the theatre with occasional excursions into film, television and radio. A great deal of it has been in the classics and he has played Hamlet, Richard III, Macbeth, Puck and all Seven Deadly Sins. Most recently he was on tour in The Trials of Oscar Wilde, playing Wilde's lawyer. He takes part in communication training programmes for business and medical clients and presents corporate training films. He helped to set up the Education Department at Shakespeare's Globe and for several years led workshops, lectured and directed scenes, as well as undertaking education work for a number of other theatres. Outside acting, he has led guided walks in London, as well as writing and recording audio walks. He is a keen cyclist and has devised many architectural bicycle tours of London.

ROSIE ARMSTRONG

Rosie graduated with a BA (Hons) in Acting from Rose Bruford College. She has worked on BBC TV and radio comedies but is most at home in the theatre where credits include: A Sherlock Carol at The Marylebone Theatre; Henry V for Shakespeare at The Tobacco Factory; Chimerica in the West End; A Small Family Business at The National Theatre, and Dangerous Corner directed by Michael Attenborough. Rosie was a research assistant on the book 100 Plays to Save the World by Elizabeth Freestone and Jeanie O'Hare. In 2023, a special edition was published for sale in the USA.

NIGEL HOWELLS

Educated at Cambridge University, Nigel studied Music and was a Choral Scholar in King's College Choir. In addition to singing at the famous annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, he recorded, broadcast and made many recordings with King's College Choir. Living between London and the historic university city of Oxford, Nigel runs culture-related educational programmes, visiting English historic houses, gardens, theatre, opera and ballet, and places of architectural interest. Nigel continues to sing professionally, performing with groups such as Polyphony, Tenebrae, The Maida Vale Singers and the John Wilson Orchestra. Appearances include BBC Promenade Concerts at the Royal Albert Hall (*The Warner Brothers' Story, Celebration of The Gershwin Brothers, Bernstein Stage and Screen, A Celebration of Rogers and Hammerstein*), national tours with Danny Elfman (*Music from the Films of Tim Burton*), recent concerts with John Mauceri and BBC Concert Orchestra (*Nightmare Before Christmas*) and performances with Arnie Wroth and the RPO (*Distant Worlds, Alice in Wonderland*), as well as *Messiah* and *St Matthew Passion* at the London Handel Festival.

BIOGRAPHIES OF SPEAKERS AND ARTISTS

IVANNO JEREMIAH

Ivanno Jeremiah, a Rwandese and Ugandan South Londoner, studied at the BRIT School of Performing Arts before a scholarship at RADA. Theatre includes: *The Suit* (Peter Brook international tour); *The Convert*, *Measure for Measure* (Young Vic); *A Soldier's Tale* (City of London Sinfonia); *The Nether* (Headlong/Royal Court); *Truth and Reconciliation* (Royal Court); *Julius Caesar* (RSC); *Constellations* (Donmar) and *Retrograde* (Kiln). Television includes: *Halo* (season two), *Humans*, unaired *Game of Thrones* prequel, *Lockwood and Co, Discovery of Witches, Cold Feet, Counterpart, Black Mirror, Injustice, The Jury, Julius Caesar* and *The Hollow Crown*.

Film includes: Woken, The Flood, Bees Make Honey, Julius Caesar, The Veteran, A Few Miles South, No More Wings (TriBeCa winner), Last Words, Limbo, The Agreement (Producer) and Ozi: Voice of the Forest.

GILES RAMSAY

An independent theatre producer, director and lecturer, Giles specialises in creating new work with artists in developing countries. He is Founding Director of the charity Developing Artists, a former Fellow of St. Chad's College, Durham University and Course Leader in Theatre at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. Educated at the universities of Cambridge, London and Durham (where he was President of the Union), Giles spent a year at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. After university, he led The British National Debate Team on its annual tour of America. Giles has previously produced international work at venues ranging from Riverside Studios, British Museum, Ronnie Scott's Jazz Club, Young Vic and National Theatre, as well as at The Pleasance, Assembly Rooms and The King's and Traverse Theatres in Edinburgh. He has also run theatre projects in Botswana, Cape Verde, Equatorial Guinea, Kenya, Kosovo, Palestine, Mexico, Thailand and Zimbabwe, as well as regularly lecturing on Cunard's Queen Mary 2.

LORD KINNOCK

Lord Kinnock, is a Welsh politician. He served as a Labour Party Member of Parliament from 1970 until 1995, first for Bedwellty and then for Islwy. He was leader of the Labour Party from 1983 to 1992 and led the Party into the elections defeats of 1987 at the hands of Margaret Thatcher, and 1992 at the hands of John Major. For over a decade, he was one of Britain's most recognisable politicians. He helped soften the Labour Party's image in the late 1980s and many credit him for laying the groundwork for Tony Blair's 'New Labour'. After leaving Parliament, Lord Kinnock became European Commissioner for Transport (1995-1999) and then Vice-President of the European Commission (1999-2004).

LIZ WHITE

Liz White trained at the Liverpool Institute for Performing Arts.

KATE BASSETT

Kate Bassett is a British journalist, writer, dramaturg and script consultant for stage and screen. For twenty years she worked as a feature writer and theatre reviewer for the *Independent on Sunday*, *Daily Telegraph* and *The Times*. Her book *In Two Minds: A Biography of Jonathan Miller* was shortlisted for the Sheridan Morley Prize for Theatre Biography, the Theatre Book Prize and the HW Fisher Best First Biography Prize. From 2016 to 2023, Kate was Chichester Festival Theatre's Literary Associate and since then has worked as a script consultant and verbatim playwright for companies including the BBC and Royal Court Theatre.
